

Diversity rules

Police Review is recognising the brightest and best officers in the service at its 20th annual gala awards ceremony. This week, we feature the officers and police staff who have been nominated for the Diversity in Action Award.

This year is the 20th since the first *Police Review* Gala Awards took place. The event recognises the work of largely unsung police officers across the country.

The 2011 ceremony takes place at the London Hilton Park Lane hotel in central London on Thursday 3 November. All 159 officers and teams nominated in all six categories have been invited to attend.

Police Review is running a 12-week series to showcase every nominee in the six award categories. This week we are introducing the 18 groups of officers who have been nominated for the Diversity in Action Award.

The other categories are Special Recognition Award, Community Police Officer of the Year, Police Community Support Officer of the Year, Lifetime Achievement and Student Officer of the Year.

NAME: PC LOUISE DEMBICKI

FORCE: AVON AND SOMERSET CONSTABULARY

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

As the community schools officer for the Bristol Metropolitan Academy, PC Louise Dembicki works in a 'very challenging and culturally diverse' school, her force says. Having identified that many children at the school did not trust the police service and were reluctant to report incidents, she arranged for staff to be trained in restorative justice to resolve low-level criminal and anti-social behaviour. PC Dembicki has also developed the 'Impact on knife crime' project.

Her force say she has worked to 'gain the trust of pupils', with more students reporting incidents of abuse at home, as well as helping to bridge the generation gap through a burglary awareness project with a local residential home.

WHAT OTHERS SAY:

A force spokesman says: 'Over the past two years, Louise has made a real difference to the children's lives, helping those socially excluded to integrate better within society and further their chances in life.'

NAME: NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING UNIT

TEAM HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2010, the British Transport Police, working with Arc Theatre, commissioned *PACT*, a play aimed at teenagers that hopes to improve relations between young people and the police service. Insp Tom Naughton (above left, with Det Ch Supt Martin Fry) and other members of the Neighbourhood Policing and Partnership Unit consulted young people to accurately reflect in the play their perceptions of the police.

The production, which has received good feedback, tells the story of a teenager who witnesses the death of a young drug dealer and his dilemma over 'snitching' on gang members.

TEAM HIGHLIGHTS:

When the team recognised a gap in the provision of personal safety information for young deaf people, PC David Woodland and Stephen Williams, the force's youth issues strategic support officer (left to right, above), worked with the Exeter Royal Academy for Deaf Education. They improved accessibility to the emergency text service for students, as well as guiding young people to the two personal safety websites for young people. In April 2011, the team produced signed videos for a personal safety website with four students from the Academy.
